Deepfakes are artificial intelligence (AI) generated videos, pictures or audio clips made to look real. The research included interviews with 1,000 children across Great Britain aged 8 to 15-years-old. Findings included: 50% of 8- to 15-year-olds said they had seen at least one deepfake online in the last six months; 20% of 8- to 15-year-olds reported feeling confident in their ability to identify a deepfake; and 32% of this age group reported having encountered a deepfake scam advert.
