The Departments of Justice, Health and Education have published an action plan to address child criminal exploitation in Northern Ireland. The plan is a cross-departmental, multi-agency plan to improve the response of Government to the criminal exploitation of young people and to embed this within the child protection system. The Safeguarding Board for Northern Ireland (SBNI) will lead on a significant number of actions under the plan to ensure a trauma-informed multi-agency approach.

Girls' wellbeing

Girlguiding has published a survey on the challenges facing girls in the UK. The 16th Girls' attitudes survey captures the views of 2,500 girls and young women on sexism and safety, online harm, appearance and wellbeing, the cost-of-living crisis, and their future. Findings include: 47% of 11- to 21-year-olds reported feeling less safe than ten years ago due to sexism and misogyny; and 77% of girls and young women aged 7- to 21-years-old said they had experienced online harm in the last year.

Kinship care

The Centre for Excellence for Children's Care and Protection (CELCIS) and the Scottish Centre for Administrative Data Research (SCADR) have published a report on the experiences of children and young people growing up in kinship care in Scotland. The research analysed data from over 19,000 children who lived in kinship care between 2008 and 2019. Findings include: parental substance misuse was the most common concern that led to children being added to the child protection register; and there was a moderate relationship between the level of deprivation within a local authority area, and the proportion of children in kinship care. The report also highlights the need for kinship carers to be given tailored support and for reasons behind regional variation in children's experiences of kinship care to be better understood.

The Centre for Excellence for Children's Care and Protection (CELCIS) and the Nuffield Foundation have published a report on non-compulsory arrangements for caring for children and young people in need of care and protection in Scotland. The report reveals how arrangements made under Section 25 of the Children (Scotland) Act 1995 are used, understood and experienced. Key findings include: the use of Section 25 arrangements has approximately doubled over the last ten years; and social workers often experience ethical challenges in using Section 25 arrangements. The report calls for a new, shared vision into the role and purpose of Section 25, with a focus on the voices of children and young people.
