Straightforward 💥 🛠

- Join us for one of our live events Join our five free online events for KS1-4, featuring inspiring authors and artists with lived experience of seeking sanctuary
- Hold an assembly or deliver a lesson Use resources developed by us or our partners to explore this year's theme for Refugee Week, "Community as a Super Power."


Really going for it! ***

- Explore your area's migration history Share stories of local refugee migration and involve parents and carers in showcasing and celebrating the diversity of your community. We have a toolkit to help you get started!
- Get creative and hold an exhibition! Use our resources to inspire your pupils to respond creatively (through junk modelling, music, art, poetry etc) to their learning and showcase their work to the school community and beyond.

A bit more effort ***

- A whole day or week of activities -Choose from our teaching resources and events, and timetable a whole day or week of learning to deepen your pupils' understanding of migration and seeking sanctuary
- Signpost Refugee Week Share local and national events of interest and involve your school community in the world's largest festival celebrating the creativity, contributions and resilience of people seeking sanctuary
- **Fundraise** Hold a non-uniform day and wear green and/or yellow to raise funds for Schools of Sanctuary or a local organisation that supports people seeking sanctuary
- Improve provision for refugee pupils -Use the training, guidance, and resources which we share to improve how you support refugee pupils and their families


