The Department for Education (DfE) has published early findings from an	
evaluation of the family finding and befriending and mentoring	
programme in England. Delivered across 45 local authorities, the	
programme provides care experienced children and young people with	
opportunities to build positive relationships and networks. The report	

focuses on perceptions of the programme based on data collected from participants and professionals. Key findings include: it took time for professionals to build trust with participants; most local delivery teams reported that the voices of children and young people informed how the programme was delivered; and reported benefits included children feeling less lonely, having an enhanced sense of identity, and having improved confidence and independence. The report highlights that while data suggests positive findings during the programme's first year, further evaluation is needed.

Child health

The Department of Health has published a framework for promoting and protecting the health of children aged 0- to-19-years-old in Northern Ireland. The Healthy Child, Healthy Future framework covers areas including: a whole child health approach; relationship building and continuity of carer; parenting support and positive parenting; and an increased focus on vulnerable families, and babies and children with additional health or social needs. It also outlines principles for safeguarding children, including: child protection as a shared responsibility; supporting care experienced children and young people; and identifying domestic abuse, intimate partner violence, and hidden harm. The framework includes professional guidance and service pathway flowcharts.

The group is calling on all political parties to: ensure children's rights are applied from birth; invest in early support for families; and place babies and young children at the centre of policy making.

Youth violence: services

The Department for Education (DfE) has published two new reports from the serious violence research programme in collaboration with the Youth Endowment Fund. The first report examines how schools in England identify and respond to serious violence and knife crime, based on interviews and focus groups with school leaders, teachers and other staff. The second report explores how children and young people's experiences with services in England, such as education, health and social care, influences their identity formation and vulnerability to violence. Findings include that children's identity-shaping experiences with services can influence their involvement in or protection from violence.

The Youth Endowment Fund has published a blog post on the number of knife crime related hospitalisations in England. Key findings from data published by NHS Digital shows 409 0- to 17-year-olds were hospitalised due to knife assault between April 2024 and March 2025, a 20% decrease from 2023-24. The blog post highlights the importance of evidence-based violence prevention in supporting children affected by and in fear of violence.

SWGfL, part of the UK Safer Internet Centre, has launched a survey exploring young people's perspectives and experiences of reporting online harm. The anonymous survey is for UK 13- to-24-year-olds and aims to deepen understanding of how young people view and respond to harmful online behaviour. Results from the survey will help inform: the design of support services for children, young people, and families; the development of tools and reporting systems that respond effectively to harmful online behaviour; and the creation of policies that ensure safer, more supportive online spaces for all.
